Historic moment in parliament

As the Temporary Speaker and National Party Whip, I had the honour of opening the NSW Parliament last month after the Deputy Speaker failed to arrive to carry out her duties.

Had I refused or been unavailable, the sitting of NSW Parliament at 10am on 29 October, 2010 would not have been able to commence until a Temporary Speaker was elected, which would have required a quorum of Government Members.

It was an historic occasion as it has been revealed this was the first time that an Opposition Member has had to conduct the opening of Parliament.

I had no hesitation in performing the Opening as the Parliament represents the people of NSW and they could not be held to ransom because of the attitudes of the Keneally Labor Government.

More police needed

In one of my speeches in Parliament last month I raised my concerns over need for additional police officers to the Richmond and Tweed-Byron Local Area Commands (LAC).

It was recently announced the Lismore electorate, which takes in a big part of the Richmond LAC and part of the Tweed-Byron LAC, will only receive nine new officers out of the 1000 graduating police officers.

The allocation of police officers to our two Commands is insufficient for the needs of our fast growing region and is a slap in the face for our community.

More than two million visitors visit the Northern Rivers region each year. We have a ratio of one police officer to 700 residents when the ratio for the rest of the State is one police officer to 500 residents. That is a disgrace.

In addition, long-term sick and stress leave, which is greater here than in other parts of the State, is causing ongoing pressure to both those on leave and those left to cover the workload.

The Keneally Labor Government is treating people on the North Coast with contempt. The Commissioner of Police and the police executive must urgently address these issues.

I will continue to make representations to ensure that this problem is addressed.

Palliative Care Workers thanked

In another of my Parliament speeches last month I highlighted the importance and my appreciation for palliative care workers and the service they provide around the state.

Palliative care affirms life and treats dying as a normal process; it neither hastens nor postpones death; it provides relief from pain and other distressing symptoms; it integrates the physical, psychological, social, emotional and spiritual aspects of care with coordinated assessment and management of each person's need; it offers a support to help the family cope during the person's illness and in their bereavement; and it also offers a support system that enables people to stay in their own home for those last crucial days, hours and minutes.

Sadly, funding cutbacks made by the State Labor Government in 2009 has meant the loss of a palliative care social worker position based out of St Vincent's Hospital, Lismore.

The loss of this part-time position, which had serviced 100 patients a month, has left many people in this region stripped of the benefits palliative care offers.

People in our region do not always have access to transport and therefore rely on social workers to visit them.

Despite this lack of funding, everyone involved with palliative care throughout the North Coast Area Health Service, and in particular the team of dedicated staff operating out of Lismore's St Vincent's Hospital coordinated by Joanne Cooper and headed by Dr Joanne Doran, the Palliative Care Physician and Director of Palliative Care for the North Coast Area Health Service, is to be thanked for the wonderful work they do. They truly offer an invaluable service to so many.

Solar rebate scheme under fire

I have been inundated with queries relating to the current Labor Government's solar bonus scheme and the recent changes introduced.

At midnight, Wednesday 27 October 2010, Labor's Solar Bonus Scheme was closed in its initial form. The far too generous offer of 60 cents per kw was replaced with a new tariff rate of 20 cents/kw.

The reason for the change was just as the Coalition had expected, a massive oversubscription leading to a horrific financial blow out.

The flawed scheme was supposed to cost \$202 million over seven years but it will now cost at least \$1.5 billion – eight times the advice given to Parliament last year.

The onus of this costly blow out will be on families who will pay an extra \$100 per year on their electricity bills every year from 1 July 2011 until at least 2017.

The solar industry will also suffer terribly with panel installation companies already stating they will be forced to axe jobs.

The Coalition is now compiling a suitable energy policy to be released prior to the State election.

Funding for Festivals and Cultural Events

Festivals and major cultural events in the Lismore Electorate may be able to benefit financially under the Community Development Grants Program (Sponsorship).

Applications are now open for not-for-profit incorporated organisations to receive up to \$5,000 for special events such as annual festivals and major cultural events that are scheduled no earlier than 1 April 2011.

Examples of projects supported by funding include: -

- The hosting of seminars and conferences
- Multicultural and inter-community forums
- Local festivals and events
- Teaching craft skills to target groups from a culturally diverse background.

Projects can include capital purchases. Applications close on 17 December 2010.

1. Withdraw the historic charges of manslaughter against our three commandos in regard to a night combat mission in Oruzgan Province on 12 February 2009.
2. Reinstigate the traditional system of Courts Martial;
3. Re-assign the Director of Military Prosecutions within the Australian Defence Force Chain of Command.
4. Establish an Office of Military Defender to provide legal representation to any troops charged by the Director of Military Prosecutions.
5. Include a protective clause for Australian troops on active service in Afghanistan.
